Reading Role Models:

As parents, we can encourage our children to read by being role models.

Why not:

- Set aside a specific time where the whole family sits down and reads for 15 mins
- Read aloud from your children's books and then ask your children to read the same passage. Your children will copy your reading style and will read more fluently because they have already heard any new vocabulary.
- Spend time discussing your reading with your children (if appropriate!).
- As a family, read a news/magazine article together and then discuss its contents.



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Book Reviews




Tyger by SF Said
